The Tree and The Fruit

"15 Beware of false prophets, which come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravening wolves. 16 Ye shall know them by their fruits. Do men gather grapes of thorns, or figs of thistles? 17 Even so every good tree bringeth forth good fruit; but a corrupt tree bringeth forth evil fruit." Matthew 7:15-17

August marks the end of the summer where students return to school but also the time when apples are season and many other fruits. Beginning in May, there are some fruit trees such as plums that begin bearing fruit. Regardless of a persons ability to look at a leaf or a stem or even the roots, everyone will agree that the final

determination of which fruit tree has fruit is determined by the fruit it bears. Pear trees bear pears, Plum trees bear plums, peach trees bear peaches, olive trees bear olives, and apple trees bear apples. All of them LOOK like trees with stems, leaves, a trunk, and roots.

Today, we live in a period of nicety and niceness. We will know the tree by the fruit it bears more so than the name that it gives itself.

Recovering Recyclables

According to the Georgia Statewide Waste Composition Study (2005), nearly 2.6 million tons (approximately 40 percent) of the municipal solid waste (MSW) Georgians throw away per year are recyclable materials. The market value of those commodities was estimated to be approximately \$250 million worth of reusable materials.

Georgians' Garbage

In fiscal year 2006, Georgians disposed of 17.4 million tons of garbage - an average of 6.42 pounds per day per person — more than twice the national average of 2.46 pounds. This amount includes waste disposed in landfills, waste-to-energy facilities, and waste imported from other states.

Georgia Disciples of Christ Black Leadership

The 2018 Georgia Regional Assembly adopted a resolution to support the Poor People's Campaign. The Poor People's Campaign has a focus "uniting tens of thousands of people across the country to challenge the evils of systemic racism, poverty, the war economy, ecological devastation and the nation's distorted morality. This project will address three objectives associated with this initia-

tive:

- Create a platform to give African American DOC churches historical context for African Americans in the Disciple of Christ movement and improve connection with identity within the Disciples of Christ (The Christian Church).
- Raise awareness of systemic issues of racism, poverty, the war economy, ecologi-

- cal devastation, and health disparities in Georgia



Marking History in Prattville, Alabama

Jesus taught in the temple and even the Apostle Paul instructed Timothy to study to show yourself approved. The value of education is often overlooked or ignored by those who readily need it and avoided as much as possible by those who fear it.

For many years, African Americans were denied the right and the ability educated their children, but Booker T. Washington and Julius Rosenwald of the Sears and Roebuck Company worked together to help communities build schools throughout the south. There is one such school in the Prattville, Alabama which just turned 100 years old and received a historic marker denoting its value.

This school allowed former slaves and sharecroppers to educate their children which provided access to new career opportunities such as doctors, lawyers, ministers, engineers, teachers and so many more.

Pastor Marshall traveled to Prattville, Alabama on July 6, 2019 to preside over this historic moment in this community.

Helping Save Moms and Babies

African American babies have the highest mortality among all demographics especially in the south. Based on ratings provided by the March of Dimes (which found the cure for Polio), most of the southern states get a grade of D and F for the amount of babies that are dying.

Through the support of the

March of Dimes, ground breaking research is being done to increase the health of moms and babies. Pastor Marshall works as a national liaison with the March of Dimes and Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. to promote healthy moms and babies; respect and responsibility; fatherhood; preventing STI's, and Domestic Violence. This program is called PROJECT ALPHA.


New Initiative To Address HIV/AIDS

While there are new medicines to allow those living with HIV/AIDS to have productive lives. Approximately 1.1 million people in the U.S. are living with HIV today. About 15 percent of them (1 in 7) are unaware they are infected.

An estimated 38,700 Americans became newly infected with HIV

in 2016. There are approximately 37,155 people living with HIV in Atlanta.

To make a difference, Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc entered into a partnership with AIDS Healthcare Foundation under the leadership of Pastor Marshall to make a differences in the 7 leading areas across the United States: Metro Atlanta, Baltimore/ Washington DC, Miami, Los Angeles, Chicago, Cleveland (OH), Houston, and Dallas to develop a pilot program to address the issue in these communities through the fraternity's PROJECT ALPHA program.
